

Linda Steiner Sichel transitioned from clinical nursing to public health in 1999 as a Public Health Prevention Specialist fellow at the Center for Disease Control and Prevention where she worked with the National Immunization Program tracking vaccine usage, and with the National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention on obesity.
