

**PRINCETON COUNCIL MEETING**  
**November 24, 2014**

A meeting of the Mayor and Council was held on this date at 6:00 p.m. in the Main Meeting Room in the municipal complex, 400 Witherspoon Street, Princeton, NJ 08540.

**NOTICE OF MEETING**

The Clerk read the following statement.

The following is an accurate statement concerning the providing of notice of this meeting and said statement shall be entered in the minutes of this meeting. On January 2, 2014 at 6:45 p.m., said schedule was posted on the official bulletin board in the Municipal Building, transmitted to the Princeton Packet, the Trenton Times, the Torontonion, the Town Topics, and filed with the Municipal Clerk.

**ROLL CALL**

The Municipal Clerk then called the roll.

Present: Mesdames Butler, Crumiller, Howard and Messers Miller and Simon and Mayor Lempert.

Absent: Mr. Liverman.

Also Present: Mr. Dashield, Ms. Monzo, Mr. Kiser, and Ms. Maddox.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

The audience participated in the Pledge of Allegiance.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Mr. Miller offered a motion to approve the minutes of September 8, 2014 as presented. Ms. Butler seconded the motion which was carried unanimously by those present.

Ms. Butler offered a motion to approve the minutes of September 22, 2014 as amended. Ms. Crumiller seconded the motion which was carried unanimously by those present.

Ms. Crumiller offered a motion to approve the minutes of September 29, 2014 as presented. Mr. Miller seconded the motion which was carried unanimously by those present.

Mr. Miller offered a motion to approve the minutes of November 3, 2014 as presented. Ms. Butler seconded the motion which was carried unanimously by those present.

**COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC**

Daniel Harris, 28 Dodds Lane reported to the Mayor and Council that there will be a peaceful demonstration tomorrow, November 25, 2014 in regard to the Ferguson ruling.

Kip Cherry, 24 Dempsey Avenue spoke to Council in regard to the opening of the Dinky Station and asked that Council look at the Memorandum of Understanding with Princeton University and the ridership. She said that the MOU says that we should implement a Formal promotional plan to increase ridership of the Dinky and that this was supposed to start in 2011, so we are late in taking advantage of this benefit of the MOU. Ms. Cherry also said that now is the best time to act to win back the Tiger PAW riders and that the MOU also says that the University will work with Princeton to encourage NJ Transit to provide additional Dinky service, including during off peak hours and week end hours. She said that what is critical now is that all parties work together to increase ridership to previous levels and beyond. With a goal of 20% over the 2013 level by the end of 2015.

## **REPORTS**

### **September Police Report**

Chief Sutter reviewed the September Police report with Council and noted that the last two pages of the report reflected canine activity and will be a regular part of the report. Ms. Howard said that we are waiting for the Ferguson decision and asked Chief Sutter if he was ready for it. Chief Sutter said that he was. Ms. Butler referred to a recent incident at Tiger Inn. Chief Sutter said that this was an open investigation and that it was wholly dependent on someone coming forward.

### **Securities Exchange Commission Municipalities Continuing Disclosure Cooperative Initiative, Edward McManimon and Sherry Tracey**

Edward McManimon and Sherry Tracey, McManimon and Scotland, Bond Council discussed with the Mayor and Council the Securities Exchange Commission Municipalities Continuing Disclosure Cooperative Initiative. Mr. McManimon said that we would be well served to take advantage of this SEC initiative.

## **COUNCIL REPORTS**

Ms. Crumiller reported that the Code Review Committee has begun looking at taxis, signage and animals.

Mr. Miller reported that the Affordable Housing Task Force has had its organization meeting.

Ms. Butler said that Code Review has met with owner of cab companies. She also reported that the Recreation Board has adopted a concussion policy.

Mayor Lempert reported that Council will hold a special meeting on December 1, 2014 to discuss potential appointments to Boards, Committees and Commissions. She also reported that at the League of Municipalities

Conference in Atlantic City last week, Princeton was awarded a Leadership Award in Sustainability and was well represented on a panel entitled "My Brother's Keeper Initiative".

## **WORK SESSION**

### **Witherspoon Street Corridor Discussion**

Lee Solow, Planning Director said that this discussion began on September 22, 2014. At that time there were concerns about traffic, the street scape and capacity. Mr. Solow discussed with Council a power point presentation regarding the Witherspoon Corridor Zoning Capacity Analysis and the permitted uses in the various zones.

Ms. Crumiller said that if we want to add more density it should be in the central business district. Mr. Solow said that he would like to see zoning reflect what can actually be built.

Yina Moore, 19 Green Street said that history is an important part of the African American community. Developers are buying multiple properties, there are more non-conforming lots and more dense development.

Marvin Reed, chair Master Plan Committee, said there should be a strong emphasis on preserving the character of the neighborhood and spoke about tightening up zoning.

Anne Neumann, Alexander Street spoke about maximum lot size for the John Witherspoon neighborhood.

Daniel Harris, 28 Dodds Lane asked what kinds of retail establishments are and are not desired and should there be a limit on square footage permitted for retail establishments? He said that if density is already greater than zoning allows, and people need really affordable housing units, possibly subsidized, then perhaps we should look at the Franklin Street lot that will be deeded by Princeton University to Princeton municipality, an idea which Marvin Reed said was "on the right track."

Jim Kilgore, 492 Pretty Brook Road, discussed the FAR ratio and said that many lots exceed the FAR.

Ms. Crumiller said that she was still having trouble envisioning out of scale buildings.

Mayor Lempert asked if there would be a study of areas in the historic districts. Mr. Solow said that it depended on the time commitment.

Ms. Butler asked what the visioning process was and what the time commitment involved. Mr. Solow said that the process has already begun, and basically involves looking at what is on the ground and what is in the air around it.

Ms. Crumiller said that she hasn't heard anyone say that we would like to change the zoning.

Mayor Lempert said that Council will revisit this discussion again at a future meeting to be determined.

**ORDINANCE PUBLIC HEARING**  
**Deleting RSC-1 Zone**

Mayor Lempert read by title an ordinance entitled An Ordinance by Princeton Deleting the Residential Senior Community – 1 Overlay Zone (RSC-1) District in the Municipality, Removing the RSC-1 Designation from the Princeton Township Zoning Map and Amending and Supplementing the “Code of the Township of Princeton, New Jersey, 1968” in Connection Therewith.

Ms. Butler said that she preferred zoning that allowed seniors but allowed a mixed age.

Mr. Simon said that he was aware that there was a protest filed on behalf of the property owners. He also noted that he understood that there was a need for a super majority vote in order for the ordinance to be adopted.

Mayor Lempert opened the public hearing.

Mike Pisauro, Stony brook Millstone Watershed Association, said that he was glad to see such a glut of age restricted housing and urged Council to adopt the proposed ordinance.

Wendy Mager, 459 Cherry Hilly Road, said that she was in favor of the proposed ordinance.

Chuck Vissanto, Mt. Lucas Road said that he is a longtime proponent of this type of legislation and supports the current overlay ordinance.

Mark Solomon, Esq., said that he represents the owners of the properties and asked Council not to move ahead in adopting the proposed ordinance. He said that a protest has been filed on behalf of the property owners.

Ms. Butler asked why does this mean so much to them.

Mr. Solomon said that it applies only to these property and nowhere else.

Kip Cherry, 24 Dempsey Avenue said that she did not think that the overlay was good from the beginning and was ill conceived.

There being no further public comment, the public hearing was closed.

Ms. Crumiller offered a motion to approve the proposed ordinance on second reading. The motion was seconded by Mr. Miller and carried unanimously by those present.

### Juvenile Report-September 2014

#### Juveniles Petitioned to Family Court

Two girls ages 15 and 17 were charged with Defiant Trespass and Harassment after they went to another juvenile's home to instigate a physical fight. They repeatedly cursed at and invaded the personal space of the child's mother and refused to leave the property after being advised to do so several times.

A 16 year old Trenton boy was charged with Receiving Stolen Property and Fencing after he contacted the owner of a stolen cell phone and offered to sell it back to him. The juvenile was arrested when he attempted to conduct the transaction with an undercover Detective who was posing as the owner of the phone.

#### Curbside Warnings

Two juveniles were given a curbside warning after a 15 year old boy called a 14 year old girl an offensive derogatory name and the girl slapped him. The issue was settled among the families.

A 12 year old boy was given a curbside warning after attempting to shoplift a tin of Crazy Aaron's Thinking Putty at JaZams Toy Store.

A 13 year old boy was given a curbside warning after placing two small music boxes into his bag while shopping at JaZams Toy Store.

#### Family Crisis or Mental Health Incidents

A 17 year old boy with a previous history of an alcohol related incident hosted a party at which alcohol was served without his parent's knowledge. Patrols were summoned by neighbors to investigate a noise complaint and upon their arrival approximately 25 juveniles scattered from the property.

A 16 year old boy was reported missing after he did not return home after having a fight with his father. He was subsequently located by police and returned home.

A 17 year old girl was reported missing after not returning home from being out with friends. She was located at the Princeton High School the following day.

### **Juvenile Victims**

A teacher had sexual relations with a 16 year old student and was charged with two counts of Sexual Assault and one count of Endangering the Welfare of a Child.

### **Community Outreach**

A program on Immigration Law with speaker, Ryan Lilienthal, was hosted by the Princeton Police Department and Princeton Human Services at St. Paul's Church.

### **General**

The State of New Jersey Juvenile Justice Commission conducted an audit of the police department juvenile custody procedures. The department was found to be in compliance.

September 17<sup>th</sup>- SNB attended an evacuation drill at the Community Park School.


September 29<sup>th</sup>- SNB met with the Institute for Advanced Study to share information and review emergency protocols in place at their campus.

# Total Arrests










