Princeton Community Bike Share

Ms. Appelget said that there are currently 70 bicycles in total in the program, with 300 active members.

Honorable City Council of Princeton, New Jersey:


I am sorry I could not stay until the end of the recent city council meeting discussing the historical Witherspoon/Jackson district because I was sick with a strep throat and fever, and had to leave before your discussion and decision on my request for an exemption from the historical district. Had I been able to stay, and had I felt better, I feel I could have made my case more clearly.

I would appreciate your considering an exemption for my one parcel property at 282-86, Witherspoon Street, from the new historical district, for the following reasons:

1. It was not part of the original historical Witherspoon/Jackson district.
2. In light of the Princeton Packet's exemption, it would be reasonable to consider my property with the same logic, as we both front Witherspoon Street, we face commercial property directly across us on Witherspoon Street (I am across the street from the Medical Arts Building), and both of our properties have always been zoned B-1; thus, our properties have a lot in common.
3. Unfortunately, the professional survey group that was discussing the new parameters of the historical district never once contacted me; nor did the planning group contact me to indicate that my property would be part of this new historical district. Had I been contacted in an appropriate time and manner, I would have engaged this situation in better fashion and I feel we would not be facing this situation.

Once again, thank you taking time to consider this matter; I know we all want what is best for Princeton. If I can be of further assistance in this matter; I am at your beck and call.
