Present: Council President Andrew Koontz, Councilman David Goldfarb, Councilman Roger Martindell, Councilman Kevin Wilkes, and Mayor Mildred Trotman

Absent: Councilwoman Margaret Karcher and Councilwoman Barbara Trelstad

Staff Present: Borough Administrator Robert W. Bruschi, Borough Attorney Karen L. Cayci, Borough Engineer Christopher M. Budzinski, Borough Clerk Andrea Lea Quinty

Mayor Trotman called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. and read the open public meetings statement as follows:

*“This meeting is called to order pursuant to the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Law. This meeting of May 26, 2009, was included in a list of meetings sent to and advertised in the Princeton Packet and Trenton Times, posted on the bulletin board in the Borough of Princeton municipal building and has remained continuously posted as the required notices under the statute. In addition a copy of this notice is and has been available to the public and is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk. Proper notice having been given, the Borough Clerk is directed to include this statement in the minutes of this meeting.”*

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item C, Resolution 2009-R161**, as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R161  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
INTO CLOSED SESSION ON MAY 26, 2009**

**WHEREAS**, the Open Public Meetings Act, P.L. 1975, Chapter 231 permits the exclusion of the public forum from a meeting in certain circumstances; and

**WHEREAS**, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances may presently exist; and

**WHEREAS**, the Governing Body wishes to discuss the following issues:

1. Closed session minutes
2. Negotiations — Princeton Township/North Ridge

**WHEREAS**, minutes will be kept and once the matter involving confidentiality of the above no longer requires that confidentiality, then minutes can be made public; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the public be excluded from this meeting.

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Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve; Council President Koontz seconded. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Hearing no nay votes, Mayor Trotman proclaimed the resolution approved.

Borough Council recessed into closed session.

At 7:30 P.M. Council reconvened into open session.

Mayor Trotman asked all present to rise for **Agenda Item D, Salute to the Flag.**

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item E, Approval of Minutes.**

Presented for approval were the minutes of the closed session of May 5, 2009.

Council President Koontz moved to approve the minutes of the closed session of May 5, 2009, Councilman Wilkes seconded, and Council approved unanimously four to zero.

Presented for approval were the minutes of the open session of May 5, 2009.

Council President Koontz moved to approve the minutes of the open session of May 5, 2009, and Councilman Goldfarb seconded. Councilman Wilkes proposed three wording modifications, which mover and seconder accepted. Council approved the minutes unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item F, Summary — Closed Session Discussion** — *Robert W. Bruschi, Borough Administrator.*

Mr. Bruschi reported that Council discussed upcoming, nonbinding arbitration for North Ridge sewer. Council will return to closed session at the conclusion of the open meeting to complete the conversation.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item G, Public Presentation**, and asked if anyone present wished to address the Council with an issue not on the agenda.

There were no public presentations.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item H, Old Business (1) — Public Hearing and Adoption: Ordinance 2009-13 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 19 OF THE “CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY 1974” REGARDING MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC (Holiday Amendment).**

Council President Koontz moved to adopt Ordinance 2009-13; Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council

members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance adopted.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item H, Old Business (2) — Public Hearing and Adoption: Public Hearing and Adoption 2009-14, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 15 OF THE “CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY 1974” GARBAGE AND REFUSE (REGARDING USE OF DUMPSTERS).**

Christopher Budzinski, Borough Engineer, stated that the ordinance concerns storm water permits as related to leakage of liquids from Dumpsters.

Councilman Wilkes moved to adopt Ordinance 2009-14; Council President Koontz seconded.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance adopted.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item H, Old Business (3) — Public Hearing and Adoption: Public Hearing and Adoption Ordinance 2009-15, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 34 OF THE “CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY 1974” WATER AND SEWERS (REGARDING DISCHARGE INTO THE STORM SEWER SYSTEM).**

Council President Koontz moved to adopt Ordinance 2009-15; Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Mr. Budzinski stated this ordinance provides that private property owners (except single homes) make new paving treatable for potable solids (grate system); also a requirement for storm water permit.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance adopted.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item I, New Business (1) — Introduction and Order to Publish: Ordinance 2009-18 BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SIDEWALK IMPROVEMENTS IN AND BY THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$20,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$19,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF AND DIRECTING THE SPECIAL ASSESSMENT OF THE COST THEREOF.**

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Council President Koontz moved to introduce Ordinance 2009-18; Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Mr. Budzinski confirmed that all affected residents will be informed of any anticipated assessment prior to a public hearing.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance introduced with a public hearing on sidewalks for Harriet Drive to be held June 9, 2009.

At 7:40 P.M., Mayor Trotman reopened **Agenda Item G, Public Presentation**. Joseph Katz, 8 Greenholm Court, has followed in the *Princeton Packet* the question of unresolved debt between Borough and Township. He asked about the process and frequency of regular reconciliation of outstanding balances. Mr. Bruschi noted the issue is an ancient one, going back as far as the late 1980s. He said current policy is to reconcile capital projects on a quarterly basis as bills come in. Interest begins accruing at 60 days and continues until payment.

Mayor Trotman explained the pertinent resolutions—Township resolution mirrors Borough—to Mr. Katz, and offered to provide a copy of the resolution to him.

Regarding disputed balances, Councilman Goldfarb noted that bills are reconciled contemporaneously. Lack of documentation for very old charges—some before computerization—delayed resolution of disputes.

Mr. Katz questioned how governing body had allowed such a large debt to exist without interest being paid to Borough. Councilman Goldfarb replied that governing body acted speedily to collect once aware of the problem. Councilman Goldfarb acknowledged that late billing to Township and incomplete documentation to support Borough claims may have resulted in lower payments. Councilman Goldfarb questioned the extent to which Council should be involved in the day-to-day financial activities of Borough; Council has delegated close management to Borough employees, who do an admirable job. (Being a public entity puts any Borough mistake under the public microscope.) Mr. Bruschi observed that Sandra Webb, appointed Chief Finance Officer February 2008, immediately began researching status of old accounts; she promptly informed Council of sewer account discrepancies—leading to a “full court press” by Council and staff.

Mayor Trotman offered to Mr. Katz the opportunity to propose an agenda item for a future meeting.

Councilman Goldfarb concluded that most moneys owed Borough will be collected—but without interest.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (2) — Resolution 2009-R162** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R162  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
APPROVING AN ADENDUM TO THE COLLECTIVE NEGOTIATIONS AGREEMENT WITH  
NEW JERSEY STATE POLICEMEN'S BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION, INC., LOCAL 130,  
SUPERIOR OFFICERS' ASSOCIATION RECOGNIZING THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
POLICE SERGEANTS FOR THE PERIOD JANUARY 1, 2008 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2009**

**WHEREAS**, there is a need for the Borough of Princeton Police Sergeants to enter into a Collective Negotiations Agreement; and

**WHEREAS**, the parties entered into negotiation and as such an agreement was made for the Princeton Borough Police Sergeants for the period of January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton that the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute an Agreement with PBA Local 130, Superiors-Sergeants, Princeton Borough Police, New Jersey as a "Memorandum of Understanding" recognizing the Princeton Borough Police Sergeants in an addendum to the Lieutenants Superior Officers Association contract substantially in the form attached hereto.

1. A notice of this action shall be published in the Princeton Packet as required by law within ten (10) days of its passage.
2. An executed copy of this Agreement between the Borough and the New Jersey State Policemen's Benevolent Association, Inc. Local 130, Superiors-Sergeants, Princeton Borough Police, New Jersey and a copy of this Resolution shall be on file and available for public inspection in the Office of the Borough Clerk.
3. An executed copy of this Agreement between the Borough of Princeton and the State Policemen's Benevolent Association, Inc. Local 130, Superiors-Sergeants, Princeton Borough Police, New Jersey and a copy of this Resolution shall be forwarded to State of New Jersey Public Employers Relations Commission.

Councilman Martindell moved to approve Resolution 2009-R162 and Councilman Goldfarb seconded.

Councilman Martindell, noting similarity of the two documents—Police Benevolent Association sergeants (-R162) and Police Benevolent Association patrol officers (-R163)—limited his remarks to the sergeants' contract.

- Entry-level sergeants earn \$107,000 base—cost of benefits (Mr. Bruschi: Variable options from \$6–16,000 per year)
- Extra work provisions
  - Staff meetings—time-and-a-half pay to attend (Mr. Bruschi: Applies to sergeants *off duty*. [They are not considered management.] )
  - Departmental meetings (Mr. Bruschi: same)
  - Stand-by shift—double compensation time and double-time pay if called in
  - Records of police add-ons available to public
  - Training at time-and-a-half
  - 12-hour shifts earn 108 hours comp time (Mr. Bruschi: 12-hour shifts exceed standard annual 2080 hours [52 weeks × 40 hours per week].)
  - Extra allowance for detective (Mr. Bruschi: out-of-title rate; easier to transfer detectives as needed)
  - Field Training Officer (Mr. Bruschi: extra responsibility to “culturalize”—that is, train, evaluate, and counsel—recruits)
  - Holiday hours (Mr. Bruschi: 13 days, as all Borough employees)

- Unlimited sick days (Mr. Bruschi: historically not an issue. Mayor Trotman: aware of potential for abuse.)
- Vacation allowance (Councilman Goldfarb: aligns with Borough)
- Longevity pay
- Uniforms provided *and cleaned* (including street clothes for detectives) by Borough
- Fitness testing (Councilman Goldfarb: successful incentive)

Council discussed collective concern statewide that New Jersey Legislature dictates police pay policies.

Councilman Martindell stated that consolidation of the police forces is an important goal for taxpayers.

Councilman Goldfarb noted that such high compensation should achieve the highest level of performance from the police department.

Council President Koontz warned against *understaffing* that might result in exorbitant overtime expense.

Councilman Wilkes cautioned that spiraling costs lying ahead strongly impel unification of police forces.

Councilman Goldfarb proposed examining exactly what tasks police officers should undertake in order to avoid overtime.

Hearing no further discussion, Mayor Trotman called for a vote. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the motion passed three to one, with Councilman Martindell voting nay.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (3)—Resolution 2009-R163** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R163  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
APPROVING THE 2008 THROUGH 2009 COLLECTIVE NEGOTIATIONS AGREEMENT WITH  
NEW JERSEY STATE POLICEMEN'S BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION, INC., LOCAL 130**

**WHEREAS**, there is a need for the Borough of Princeton and the Patrol Officers of the Police Department of the Borough of Princeton to enter into a Collective Negotiations Agreement; and

**WHEREAS**, the parties entered into negotiation and as such an agreement was made for the period of January 1, 2008 through December 31, 2009.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton that the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute an Agreement with PBA Local 130 substantially in the form attached hereto.

1. A notice of this action shall be published in the Princeton Packet as required by law within ten (10) days of its passage.
2. An executed copy of this Agreement between the Borough and the New Jersey State Policemen's Benevolent Association, Inc. Local 130 and a copy of this Resolution shall be on file and available for public inspection in the Office of the Borough Clerk.

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3. An executed copy of this Agreement between the State Policemen's Benevolent Association, Inc. Local 130 and a copy of this Resolution shall be forwarded to State of New Jersey Public Employers Relations Commission.

Council President Koontz moved to approve Resolution 2009-R163, Councilman Wilkes seconded. Mayor Trotman called for a vote. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the motion passed three to one, with Councilman Martindell voting nay.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (4)—Resolution 2009-R164** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R164  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
APPOINTING MEDIATION REPRESENTATIVES**

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Princeton, Mercer County, State of New Jersey, has petitioned the Council on Affordable Housing (COAH) for substantive certification of its adopted Housing Element and Fair Share Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, N.J.A.C. 5:96-3.6 requires a 45-day period of public review of the petition and Housing Element and Fair Share Plan and all supporting documentation; and

**WHEREAS**, three objection(s) to the Borough of Princeton's Housing Element and Fair Share Plan were filed and are currently being reviewed by COAH for determination of compliance with N.J.A.C. 5:96-4.1(a); and

**WHEREAS**, N.J.A.C. 5:96-8.1 requires that COAH meet with representatives of the municipality and the objectors and attempt to mediate a resolution of the objections; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Princeton is further required by N.J.A.C. 5:96-8.2(d) 2 to adopt a resolution designating representatives to act on its behalf concerning such mediation; and

**WHEREAS**, COAH has asked the Borough of Princeton to adopt such a resolution pending COAH's review of the objections; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:96-8.2 (e), the Borough may request approval from the mediator for an expanded mediation team;

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that, pending consent of the mediator for a five person mediation team, the following persons shall constitute the representatives of the Borough of Princeton, Mercer County, State of New Jersey, and are authorized to act on its behalf and to attend, as deemed necessary and prudent, the mediation sessions:

1. Mayor Mildred T. Trotman, Planning Board Representative
2. Borough Councilman Kevin Wilkes
3. Shirley Bishop, P.P., Borough Consulting Planner
4. Karen L. Cayci, Esq., Borough Attorney
5. Derek Bridger, Borough Zoning Officer

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that these individuals are authorized to negotiate on behalf of the Borough of Princeton.

Council President Koontz moved to approve Resolution 2009-R164, Councilman Wilkes seconded, and Borough Council approved unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (5)—Resolution 2009-R165** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R165  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON**

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Princeton previously received a grant from the NJ Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program in the amount of \$89,615.00 for the purpose for rehabilitation of low and moderate income housing units at 1-10 Franklin Street being shown as Block 21.04, Lot 26 on the Borough Tax Map (“ the Property”); and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough staff has recommended to the Mayor and Council that the terms of the grant be amended to allow the Borough to repay the loan only if the units are not longer used for low and moderate income housing or if the Property is sold by the Borough; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to accomplish such amendment the Borough must provide a mortgage and note to the NJ State Department of Community Affairs encumbering the Property; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council have determined that it is appropriate and cost effective to amend the grant as set forth above;

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton that in consideration of a NJ Small Cities CDBG Program grant that the Borough of Princeton has received in the amount of \$89,615 from the Department of Community Affairs, for the purpose of rehabilitation of low and moderate income housing rental units, the Mayor and Clerk are authorized to execute the attached mortgage and note pursuant to which the Borough agrees that the property located at Block 21.04, Lot 26 on the tax map of the Borough of Princeton and known as 1-10 Franklin Street will be continued to be used for low and moderate income affordable housing. In the event that the property is not longer used for this purpose or is sold, the property will be disposed of in a manner which reasonably satisfies the Department of Community Affairs in compliance with 24 CFR Part 85.31 Real Property and the Borough promises to then repay the amount of Eighty Nine Thousand Six Hundred and Fifteen Dollars ( \$89,615.00).

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that the Mayor and Clerk are authorized to execute any necessary related documentation to amend the afore-mentioned grant to reflect the provisions of the attached mortgage and note.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve Resolution 2009-R165 and Councilman Wilkes seconded. Mr. Bruschi explained that Borough received funding. Small Cities now requests an amendment that allows repayment if Franklin Terrace ceases to be low-and-moderate housing. Borough Council approved unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (6 and 7)—Resolutions 2009-R166 and 2009-R167** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R166  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
SUPPORTING THE *CLICK IT OR TICKET*  
MOBILIZATION OF MAY 18-MAY 31, 2009**

Whereas, there were 592 motor vehicle fatalities in New Jersey in 2008; and

Whereas, a large percentage of the motor vehicle occupants killed in traffic crashes were not wearing a seat belt; and

Whereas, use of a seat belt remains the most effective way to avoid death or serious injury in a motor vehicle crash; and

Whereas, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that 135,000 lives were saved by safety belt usage nationally between 1975-2000; and

Whereas, the State of New Jersey will participate in the nationwide *Click It or Ticket* safety belt mobilization from May 18 – May 31, 2009 in an effort to raise awareness and increase safety belt usage through a combination of enforcement and education; and

Whereas, the Division of Highway Traffic Safety has set a goal of increasing the safety belt usage rate in the state from the current level of 91.75% to 100%; and

Whereas, a further increase in safety belt usage in New Jersey will save lives on our roadways;

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton declares it's support for the *Click It or Ticket* safety belt mobilization both locally and nationally from May 18 – May 31, 2009 and pledges to increase awareness of the mobilization and the benefits of safety belt use

**RESOLUTION 2009-R167  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON**

**WHEREAS**, the Borough of Princeton desires to enter into a professional services agreement in connection with certain activities as hereafter more particularly stated, and

**WHEREAS**, the services to be performed are professional services which are exempt from public bidding under the Local Public Contracts Law.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton as follows:

The Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to enter into a contract for professional services with **KIM H. MILLAR, M.D., 521 Lake Drive, NJ 08540** (hereinafter referred to as "Provider") to provide consultant services for the Borough from **January 1, 2009 through December 31, 2009**, as hereafter more particularly stated.

1. The contract so authorized shall require the Provider to provide professional medical services and other related duties as cited in the contract (attached), for a total contract amount not to exceed **\$4,380.00**.

Under this Agreement, Provider shall at all times act as an independent professional contractor and shall have no authority to act as an agent or representative of the Borough or to enter into any financial or other contractual commitment on behalf of the Borough without the prior written approval of same granted in accordance with law.

Rendition of Invoices: Payment of fees will be made upon the submission to the Provider to the Borough of invoices in duplicate in the form prescribed by the Borough not later than the tenth (10th) day of the month following that covered by the invoice, and shall specify in detail the periods for which fees are claimed for the services performed. The provider shall give written notice to the Borough when the Provider has billed eighty (80%) of the compensation set forth in paragraph I of the Agreement.

2. The form of contract shall include standard provisions common to professional service agreements entered into by the Borough and shall be subject to approval by the Borough Attorney.

3. The contract shall be awarded without competitive bidding as a contract for professional services under the provisions of the Local Public Contracts Law because the subject services will be performed by a person or persons authorized by law to practice a recognized profession and whose practice is regulated by law.

4. A notice of this action shall be published in the Princeton Packet as required by law within ten (10) days of its passage.

Council President Koontz moved to approve Resolutions 2009-R166 and -R167, Councilman Wilkes seconded, and Borough Council approved unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (8)—Resolution 2009-R168** as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R168  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
APPROVING THE PLACEMENT OF A BANNER AS REQUESTED BY THE  
PRINCETON SUMMER THEATER**

**WHEREAS**, The Princeton Summer Theater At The Hamilton Murray Theater is planning their forty second year at the Hamilton Murray Theater on the Princeton University Campus; and

**WHEREAS**, The Princeton Summer Theater has requested permission to install a banner over Washington Road in Princeton with approval of the Office of Community and State Affairs at Princeton University

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beginning Monday, June 15 through Monday, June 22, 2009 and again on Monday, July 20 through Monday July 27<sup>th</sup>, 2009 to inform the public of their performances; and

**WHEREAS**, this banner will be promptly removed after its use as required by Borough ordinances; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with Borough Ordinance 3-17 any banner that is removed by the Borough will be held by the Borough for thirty (30) days and then disposed of; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with Borough Ordinance 3-17 any applicant failing to remove a banner will not be permitted to display any banner for the succeeding two years; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the Mayor and Council hereby approve placement of said banner on Washington Road in accordance with Borough Ordinances 3-14-3-17.
