Mayor Trotman called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. and read the open public meetings statement as follows:

“This meeting is called to order pursuant to the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Law. This meeting of November 10, 2009, was included in a list of meetings sent to and advertised in the Princeton Packet and Trenton Times, posted on the bulletin board in the Borough of Princeton municipal building and has remained continuously posted as the required notices under the statute. In addition a copy of this notice is and has been available to the public and is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk. Proper notice having been given, the Borough Clerk is directed to include this statement in the minutes of this meeting.”

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item C, Resolution 2009-R301**, as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2009-R301
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON
INTO CLOSED SESSION ON NOVEMBER 10, 2009**

WHEREAS, the Open Public Meetings Act, P.L. 1975, Chapter 231 permits the exclusion of the public forum from a meeting in certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances may presently exist; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body wishes to discuss the following issues:

1. Personnel — Professional appointments
2. Negotiations — Princeton University

WHEREAS, minutes will be kept and once the matter involving confidentiality of the above no longer requires that confidentiality, then minutes can be made public; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the public be excluded from this meeting.

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Councilwoman Trelstad moved to approve; Council President Koontz seconded. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Karcher, Martindell, Trelstad, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Hearing no nay votes, Mayor Trotman proclaimed the resolution approved.

Borough Council recessed into closed session.

At 7:30 P.M. Council reconvened into open session.

Mayor Trotman asked all present to rise for **Agenda Item D, Salute to the Flag.**

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item E, Approval of Minutes.**

Presented for approval were the minutes of the open session of October 13, 2009.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve the minutes of the open session of October 13, 2009, Council President Koontz seconded, and Council approved five to zero, with Councilwoman Karcher abstaining.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item F, Public Presentation,** and asked if anyone present wished to address the Council with an issue not on the agenda.

Councilman Martindell reported he was approached by a newspaper reporter regarding settlement of a litigation matter Fahmie-Arnold v. Borough of Princeton, which was mentioned on a public website. He inquired what the Borough paid for representation and why Mayor and Council were not apprised of the settlement situation. Mr. Bruschi responded that Borough's exposure was minimal. He further explained that cases processed through the Joint Insurance Fund are noted and filed as closed. Councilman Martindell stated that Council should be informed of any dispute resulting in lawsuit and settlement.

Councilman Martindell further stated that Council should be informed immediately of any police matter before a court. Mr. Bruschi responded that Borough Administration and Police agree. Councilman Goldfarb stressed the need for Council to hear the prosecution's case—prosecutor's point of view—against a police officer before taking action. Councilman Martindell recommended revising any ordinance that includes Council as an appellant body to judicial decisions on police issues.

In other business, Mayor Trotman announced proposed free shuttle services on Saturdays and Sundays to accommodate shoppers and reduce holiday traffic.

Seeing no one further from the public, Mayor Trotman closed the public portion.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item G, Public Hearing (1) — Application to Create a Municipal Consolidation Study Commission** — *Marc Pfeiffer, Department of Community Affairs.*

Mayor Trotman announced the adoption of a unanimous joint resolution of Borough and Township approved on October 26, 2009, authorizing the three next steps toward consolidation study: (1) Township meeting to define their issues and concerns—held November 9, 2009; (2) Borough also to meet—today, November 10, 2009; (3) another joint meeting for further public input—to be held November 23, 2009. At the conclusion of the three preparatory sessions and DCA approval, each Mayor will appoint members to a consolidation study commission (CSC).

Councilman Goldfarb clarified that at issue is not only consolidation but also shared services.

Marc Pfeiffer, Deputy Director of State Division of Local Government Services, announced a hearing to be held by the Local Finance Board December 9, 2009, on the joint application for a “local option municipal consolidation study.” With consent from the Local Finance Board—possibly with modifications—Mayors would proceed with structuring Consolidation Study Commission.

Next, Mr. Pfeiffer said, the CSC submits request for proposal (RFP) to hire a consultant to undertake detailed analysis of both municipalities as to consolidation. The anticipated timetable is:

- Consultant begin spring 2010
- Consultant report end of 2010
- CSC recommend to governing bodies early 2011
- Governing bodies comment to public spring 2011
- Public referendum November 2011.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Mr. Pfeiffer on this issue.

Sheldon Sturgis, 42 Cameron Court, Managing Director of Princeton Future, read a resolution into the record that supported joint application for funding a consolidation and shared services commission.

Ronald Nielsen, 14 Humbert Street, responding to Mr. Sturgis, stated that Princeton Future members do not reside in the community. He opposed a state-funded consolidation study, noting “strings” to the money. Mr. Nielsen feared that a state-approved consultant would recommend consolidation regardless of the facts. Mr. Nielsen stated that Borough quality of life would inevitably be changed for the worse as Township assumes control.

Mr. Pfeiffer explained that the CSC, not New Jersey, chooses the consultant.

Anton Lahnston, Elm Road in the Borough, enthusiastically endorsed a *study* in order to better understand costs and benefits of consolidation, be it piecemeal or total. He supported increased collaboration and cooperation. Mr. Lahnston asked Council to insist on a specific deadline for appointment of any consultant.

Claire Jacobus, 37 Cleveland Lane, wholeheartedly urged appointment of a CSC.

Jenny Crumiller, Library Place, supported CSC, stating that best decisions are vigorously debated decisions.

Henry Powsner, 4 Queenston Place, has twice voted for consolidation and continues to support it.

Eve Niedergang, 15 Forrester Drive, co-chair of PCDO consolidation committee, announced their creation of a survey for several thousand residents of both communities. She approved a study of the issue; knowing more about the issue will only benefit.

Dudley Sipprelle, 375 Nassau Street, again asked, “What will be decided?” (1) No action; (2) vote on consolidation; (3) combination of police and public works departments (without public vote). Mr. Pfeiffer answered that the governing bodies control the choices—referendum or not, one item or two.

Marvin Reed, 6 Cameron Court, emphasized a careful (inclusive) study. He recommended looking ahead at least 10 years to anticipate development/redevelopment. Benefit must be clear for both municipalities.

Travis Linderman, 43 Palmer Square, sought a unification model. Mr. Pfeiffer stated that every aspect of community merge will be considered, including elections, debt, and so forth.

Addressing the audience, Mayor Trotman requested resumes and expressions of interest from members of the public who want to participate on the CSC. Mr. Pfeiffer suggested it is best *not* to establish predisposition for or against consolidation. Mayor Trotman expressed her intent to appoint a *balanced* board. Mr. Pfeiffer deferred to Borough Attorney.

Councilman Goldfarb also supported balance on the board.

Mayor Trotman asked concerned citizens to contact Borough Clerk Andrea Lea Quinty by letter or through the Website.

Mr. Pfeiffer stressed the need for diligence and follow through.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item H, Report (1) — Police Study – Robert A. Verry M.A., C.P.M.**

Mayor Trotman reviewed that Borough Council had requested and had received a police department study. Consultant Robert Verry was present to furnish his November 4, 2009 report to Mayor and Council. Mayor Trotman explained that Mr. Verry was to respond to six particular questions from Borough Council. She asked Mr. Verry to summarize each of his six replies before opening discussion to Council and public.

Mr. Verry said he had looked at the entire inquiry as a “package.”

1. Procedure for investigating disciplinary allegations
 - a. Recommend senior officers
 - i. Step down from union position
 - ii. Not participate in collective bargaining
— or —
 - iii. Not be assigned to investigations
 - b. Chief or designate = internal affairs officer
 - c. Distinguish between citizen and supervisory complaints
 - d. Assign separate case complaints when multiple officers
2. Recommendation for modification to disposition of personnel matters over last two years
 - a. Redefine public safety committee (PSC) and confidentiality
 - b. Remove conflicting language about responsibility
 - c. Clarify chief's authority
 - d. Define "minor" discipline
 - e. Relieve report turnaround
3. Suspension with and without pay
 - a. Grand Jury indictment
 - b. High misdemeanor
 - c. Moral turpitude
 - d. Dishonesty
— or —
 - e. Reassignment with pay
4. History/evaluation of department turnover
5. Borough ordinances—role of governing body in particular, grievance procedures
 - a. Structure and power of PSC/appropriate authority
 - b. Chief not to "adjust" a matter; mediate
 - c. Financial considerations
6. Options and methods of governing body and PSC found in other communities
 - a. Restrict public opinions of confidential matters by Council persons
 - b. Clarify chain of command
 - c. Establish authority of administrator as appropriate authority for level of accountability

Council President Koontz noted Mr. Verry's comments on governance; in particular, quorum of governing body apparent in Public Safety Committee and authority assigned to Borough Administrator. Stating that all other Borough departments report to the administrator, Council President Koontz said that bringing police under that authority is appropriate. Council President Koontz also wondered whether the police department represents a special case, with their unique powers over the public.

Councilman Goldfarb stated willingness to adopt all Mr. Verry's recommendations. He asked about conflicts that might arise with the administrator in charge of the chief. Should the administrator also control police personnel policies? Mr. Verry thought Council would ultimately decide hirings and promotions in the best interest of their constituents.

Mr. Verry offered no advice as to what person should investigate an alleged infraction by the chief, except to say someone both chief and Borough trust. Such individual should be identified now—prior to any incident.

Mr. Verry stated his personal practice was to invoke the apt criterion and suspend without pay with the knowledge of a solid case. Under Rule 10-30 (not under 10 days or over 30), he compelled a hearing on Day 11—not likely for Princeton Borough with PSC governing the police department. Mr. Verry mentioned reassignment with pay can cause morale and animosity problems (over pay and duties) with the existing crew.

Council discussed with Mr. Verry various disciplinary topics (citizen complaint versus internal charge) and public versus department personnel action. Mr. Verry stressed that confidentiality is paramount in *any* Borough employee matter, including issues involving police officers—who are, in fact, employees. Mr. Verry expressed that random spotlighting of confidential matters in the press puts “cracks” in the “concrete foundation”; there should be a single spokesperson to the public—probably the mayor. Conversely, communication between police and Council should be open and constant.

Councilman Goldfarb asked for specific recommendations regarding grievance procedure (to maintain effective discipline, be fair to officers, avoid litigation) for upcoming police contract negotiations. Mr. Verry suggested implementing an informal step to resolve conflict before formal complaint. He said it is very appropriate to assign borough administrator (no longer PSC) the role of appeals officer, with power to decide. A second appeal by the accused officer could be made to governing body; Council would sustain department charges if Council thought the matter worth pursuing through litigation.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to accept all of Mr. Verry’s recommendations.

Councilman Martindell objected to the limitations in a September 21 letter from the Deputy Attorney General in regard to limits of information disclosed by the chief of police.

Council President Koontz suggested Council request draft ordinance changes to incorporate the Verry recommendations and new policies. Council President Koontz put his statement in the form of a motion restricted to ordinance changes—Step 1. With implementation of borough administrator as “appropriate” (police supervising) authority, in Step 2, the Administrator will work with the new chief to achieve new policies.

Councilwoman Trelstad requested the motion be amended to include a deadline for receipt of first draft of ordinance amendment. Council President Koontz rephrased his motion to include a deadline of November 24, 2009. Councilwoman Trelstad seconded.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue.

Jenny Crumiller, Library Place, asked that Mr. Verry’s report be posted on the Borough website. She wondered how the PSC had managed to operate without problem for so long. Council

President Koontz noted that there have been conflicts within ordinances. He said it is now time to address problems in order to run more smoothly.

Councilman Goldfarb proposed Council's new role be to appoint the police chief and all officers above sergeant.

Councilwoman Karcher stated that PSC's effectiveness has been restricted because the "tail has been wagging the dog." PSC did not have the power to find facts during the process or on their own.

Seeing no one further, Mayor Trotman closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Council further discussed their role in police disputes.

Noting a motion on the floor, Mayor Trotman called for a vote. She proclaimed the motion carried six to zero.

Council pressed for dates for interviews of candidates for chief.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item I, Old Business (1) — Public Hearing and Adoption: Ordinance 2009-31, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 1 OF "THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY, 1974" REGARDING COLLECTION OF CREDIT CARD FEES.**

Council President Koontz moved to adopt Ordinance 2009-31; Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Karcher, Martindell, Trelstad, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance adopted.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item J, New Business (1) — Introduction and Order to Publish: Ordinance 2009-32, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 19 OF "THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY, 1974" REGARDING MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC.**

Councilman Goldfarb moved to introduce Ordinance 2009-32; Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Councilwoman Trelstad questioned language regarding Westcott Road. Borough Engineer Christopher Budzinski explained the basis for the wording.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Martindell, Trelstad, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative.

Councilwoman Karcher abstained. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance introduced with a public hearing scheduled for December 8, 2009.

Councilwoman Karcher left the meeting at 10:39 P.M.

Mayor Trotman read by title **Agenda Item J, New Business (2) — Introduction and Order to Publish: Ordinance 2009-33, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 17A OF “THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON, NEW JERSEY, 1974.”**

Councilman Wilkes moved to introduce Ordinance 2009-33; Councilwoman Trelstad seconded.

Planning Board Director Lee O. Solow stated that the ordinance clearly establishes the nature of “basement.” Secondly, Mr. Solow said that staff was approached by merchants about change-of-use (usually from retail to restaurant) parking regulations in the central business district (CBD). The change includes some exemptions and variances. Third, Planning Board recommends deleting a CBD no-parking exemption for spaces under 5,000 square feet.

Councilman Martindell left the meeting at 10:43 P.M.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue. Seeing no one, she closed the public discussion and returned to Council. Hearing no comment, Mayor Trotman called for a roll call vote. Borough Clerk called the roll. Council members Koontz, Goldfarb, Trelstad, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Mayor Trotman proclaimed the ordinance introduced with a public hearing scheduled for December 8, 2009.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton approve the bill list of NOVEMBER 10, 2009 as presented.

Council President Koontz moved to adjourn; Councilman Wilkes seconded. There being no further business, Mayor Trotman adjourned the open session meeting at 10:51 P.M.
