Mayor Trotman called the meeting to order at 7:00 P.M. and read the open public meetings statement as follows:

*“This meeting is called to order pursuant to the provisions of the Open Public Meetings Law. This meeting of August 10, 2010, was included in a list of meetings sent to and advertised in the Princeton Packet and Trenton Times, posted on the bulletin board in the Borough of Princeton municipal building and has remained continuously posted as the required notices under the statute. In addition a copy of this notice is and has been available to the public and is on file in the Office of the Borough Clerk. Proper notice having been given, the Borough Clerk is directed to include this statement in the minutes of this meeting.”*

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item C, Resolution 2010-R226**, as follows:

**RESOLUTION 2010-R226  
OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF PRINCETON  
INTO CLOSED SESSION ON AUGUST 10, 2010**

**WHEREAS**, the Open Public Meetings Act, P.L. 1975, Chapter 231 permits the exclusion of the public forum from a meeting in certain circumstances; and

**WHEREAS**, this public body is of the opinion that such circumstances may presently exist; and

**WHEREAS**, the Governing Body wishes to discuss the following issues:

1. Personnel
2. Closed session minutes — February 2, 2010

**WHEREAS**, minutes will be kept and once the matter involving confidentiality of the above no longer requires that confidentiality, then minutes can be made public; and

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** that the public be excluded from this meeting.

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Council President Koontz moved to approve; Councilman Goldfarb seconded. Council members Koontz, Crumiller, Goldfarb, Martindell, Trelstad, and Wilkes voted in the affirmative. Hearing no nay votes, Mayor Trotman proclaimed the resolution approved.

Borough Council recessed into closed session.

At 7:30 P.M. Council reconvened into open session.

Mayor Trotman asked all present to rise for **Agenda Item D, Salute to the Flag.**

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item E, Approval of Minutes.**

Presented for approval were the minutes of the open session of July 13, 2010.

Councilman Martindell moved to approve the minutes of the open session of July 13, 2010, Councilwoman Trelstad seconded, and Council approved unanimously.

Presented for approval were the minutes of the closed session of February 2, 2010.

Council President Koontz moved to approve the minutes of the closed session of February 2, 2010, Councilman Martindell seconded, and Council approved unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item E, Public Presentation**, and asked if anyone present wished to address Council with an issue not on the agenda. Mayor Trotman explained the five-minute limit for public presentations.

Anne Neumann, 22 Alexander Street, quoted messages from four Borough Council and Township Committee members that their ability to ameliorate tax burden is limited by New Jersey's constitution. They plan to look into enacting a phase-in program for those hardest hit. Ms. Neumann recommended a second revaluation in 2011 in hopes of achieving relief.

Councilman Martindell distributed a report regarding Harrison Street Park maintenance which was prepared by resident Dorothy Mullen and Councilman Martindell, after an onsite inspection with Mercer County Horticulturist Barbara Bromley. Councilman Martindell said Borough must proactively coordinate Public Works and neighbors to schedule HSP short- and long-term maintenance.

Mayor Trotman announced that revaluation will be on the agenda of August 24, 2010, for public airing.

Seeing no one further, Mayor Trotman closed the public portion.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item G, Discussion (1) — Community Pool Funding** — *Peter O'Neill, Princeton Parks and Recreation Fund (Fund).*

Mr. Peter O'Neill of 470 Riverside Drive in Princeton Township stated that Fund was created to support the capital needs of the Recreation Department; Fund was heartily endorsed by both Princetons.

Mr. O'Neill said Fund's mission is to raise \$1 million in private funding in order to reduce taxpayer burden for construction of a new pool complex. Efforts will include targeting interested swimmer groups and local corporations, naming opportunities, and a Website. Mr. O'Neill noted that Fund is stymied by lack of commitment by the towns to their bond ordinances. Even though the formal drive has not kicked off, 10% of goal has already been met.

Councilman Goldfarb revisited library funding as a model for Fund, citing the similar need for mutual assurance among private sources and governing bodies. Councilman Goldfarb expressed his personal reluctance to support the bond without a commitment from Fund; he thought the passing of ordinances would make it less likely that Fund can meet its goal.

Councilwoman Crumiller noted the generosity of Princeton residents and articulated confidence that Fund will succeed.

Council President Koontz sought further information from Mr. O'Neill as to immediate steps for Fund after passage of ordinances. Council President Koontz also requested periodic updates from Fund.

Mr. O'Neill explained three charges: (1) \$1 million from Fund to be a cash contribution to the towns, (2) \$1 million debt service (\$50,000 per year) that Recreation Department will provide from user fees, and (3) any unmet amount from (1) to come from Recreation Department coffers.

Councilwoman Trelstad asked for clarification of language regarding the two \$1-million items. Councilman Goldfarb asked for clarification of Recreation Department's contribution to debt service—as distinct from normal operating costs of the pool. Council discussed variations on wording for the joint capital funding agreement.

Councilman Goldfarb pointed out that Fund has a mandate *beyond* raising money for pool construction: Raising money for *other* Recreation Department purposes. Mr. O'Neill countered that Fund's ***number one priority*** is to help Princeton residents pay for the pool. (Of course, Fund will not decline offers for non-pool projects).

Councilman Martindell asked the nature of the \$100,000 already received. Answer: Cash from 10 donors (largest—more than \$50,000).

Mr. O'Neill declared Fund's intent to achieve \$1 million in pledges by December 31, 2010.

Councilman Wilkes explored the naming policy. Mr. O'Neill stated that names are assignable for all capital jobs listed in the Recreation Department master plan; the "asset menu" for naming opportunities has not been fully developed. Councilman Wilkes asserted that governing bodies will not necessarily approve in advance (or "unreasonably withhold") any name certified by Fund.

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Councilwoman Trelstad recommended tightening language that targets the pool complex name(s) in order to advance fundraising. Council members agreed.

Mayor Trotman opened the public discussion and asked if anyone wished to address Council on this issue.

Jo Butler, 18 Hibben Road, cited the “Sands” Library’s contribution that funded an endowment as well as construction. She suggested that a pool endowment will protect future user charges.

Mr. O’Neill clarified that timing of the onset of construction has no impact on Fund’s ability to raise \$1 million by year end 2010.

Seeing no one further, Mayor Trotman closed the public discussion and returned to Council.

Council President Koontz undertook to review Borough’s proposed language—and naming policy (pool only)—changes with Recreation Department and Township Committee.

Marvin Reed, 6 Cameron Court and former library trustee, stated that Mr. and Mrs. Sands were not on any library will-call list for assistance. He said the Sands approached the municipalities with an offer of \$5 million—thereby leaving little need for smaller contributions from everyday library users. Mr. Reed sought approval from the Sands to assign half their donation toward opening an endowment (now called “Centennial Fund”).

Councilman Goldfarb insisted on Borough Council’s involvement in any naming action.

Mayor Trotman announced that pool funding talks will conclude Monday, August 16, 2010, in a joint session at Township Hall.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item H, Report (1) — Quarterly Financial Report — Robert W. Bruschi, Borough Administrator.**

Mr. Bruschi stated that both expenditures and revenues are on target for 2010. (Hotel/motel taxes are below anticipated.) Mr. Bruschi thought overtime budgets will require close attention by staff after severe storms earlier in the year.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (1) — Resolution 2010-R227** as follows:

WHEREAS, the Princeton Regional Planning Board had approved a major Site Plan for Block 20.02, Lots 42 and 68, Nassau Inn Limited Partnership, which required the submittal of a \$71,769.00 performance guarantee for Phase I of the approval, Yankee Doodle Tap Room Patio Expansion, which was submitted in cash by the applicant; and

WHEREAS, on July 27, 2010, the applicant has requested release of said performance bond; and

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WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer advises that the improvements covered under this bond are complete and satisfactory and recommends the submittal of a maintenance bond in an amount of \$10,765.35 (15% of the original bond), which shall be posted for a one year period, expiring June 4, 2011; and

WHEREAS, the applicant has agreed to allow retainage of this maintenance bond amount from the original posted cash.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton, the Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to release \$61,003.65 to Nassau Inn, Ten Palmer Square, Princeton NJ 08542 and retain \$10,765.35 for the terms described above.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve Resolution 2010-R227, Councilwoman Trelstad seconded, and Borough Council approved unanimously.

Mayor Trotman read **Agenda Item I, New Business (2) — Resolution 2010-R228** as follows:

WHEREAS, on May 4, 2010, the Borough entered into a contract for Capital Project 09-01, Moore Street Sewer Improvements with Integrated Construction & Utilities of NJ, LLC, in an amount of \$81,433.23, and there is a need to amend said contract as outlined in the change order prepared by the Borough Engineer and;

WHEREAS, change orders are regulated by Local Finance Board Regulations (N.J.A.C. 5:30-14.4) and;

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified that funds are available.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton as follows:

1. Change Order #1 – Final to the Contract between the Borough of Princeton and Integrated Construction & Utilities of NJ, LLC for the Capital Project # 09-01 Moore Street Sewer Improvements in the amount of \$15,293.07 is hereby approved.
2. The Borough Engineer and Clerk are hereby authorized to sign the Change Order on behalf of the Borough.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve Resolution 2010-R228. Councilman Goldfarb stressed the importance of careful record-keeping for underground assets. Council President Koontz seconded. Borough Council approved unanimously.

**WHEREAS**, the Princeton Sewer Operating Committee has advised the Mayor and Borough Council of the need for electrical services throughout the sanitary sewer service area through December 2011; and

**WHEREAS**, a contract known as “Electrical Services – Various Locations within the Service Area (Borough and Township of Princeton) of the Princeton Sewer Operating Committee – September 2010 through December 2011” for said services was put out to public bid, the bids being opened on August 3, 2010; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough and PSOC staffs have reviewed the submitted bids and determined that the bid submitted by Tom L. Wells Electrical Contractor, Inc., Princeton, New Jersey is the lowest responsible bid; and

**WHEREAS**, the Borough’s Chief Financial Officer has certified that funds are available for the purposes set forth herein.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Princeton that the contract for the project known as “Electrical Services – Various Locations within the Service Area (Borough and Township of Princeton) of the Princeton Sewer Operating Committee – September 2010 through December 2011”, be awarded to Tom L. Wells Electrical Contractor, Inc., Princeton New Jersey, for a lump sum contract not to exceed \$60,000.00, with electrician rates of \$85.00 / hours straight time, \$150.00 / hour overtime and electrician helper rates of \$11.00 / hour straight time, \$30.00 / hour overtime, with material and equipment markup of 40% and the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to execute a contract with Tom L. Wells Electrical Contractor, Inc. in a form substantially similar to the agreement attached hereto.

Councilman Goldfarb moved to approve Resolution 2010-R229 and Councilman Wilkes seconded.

Councilman Goldfarb wondered why there was so little response to the bid for this work. He speculated that Borough might be able to write bids for easier compliance by small businesses.

Borough Council approved unanimously.
