A meeting of the Mayor and Council was held on this date at 7:00 p.m. in the Main Meeting Room in the municipal complex, 400 Witherspoon Street, Princeton, NJ 08540.

Mayor Lempert read a proclamation in regard to the Princeton Youth Hockey Champions.

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**PRESENTATION**

**Judy Wilson, Superintendent, Princeton School District Budget**

Ms. Wilson provided an update to the Mayor and Council regarding the Princeton School budget. Ms. Wilson noted that there will be no public vote on the school board budget this April but that there was a public budget forum in late March. She said that the budget is heavily dependent on local property tax. All work that had been promised in the bond referendum will be finished on time.

Ms. Butler offered her congratulations on Ms. Wilson's upcoming retirement and thanked her for her years of service. Ms. Butler asked about the projected enrollment for the Princeton Schools. Ms. Wilson said that it was difficult to predict, but that they were about to do a new demographic assessment.

Mr. Miller thanked the schools and the Library for their help during Hurricane Sandy. Mr. Liverman also offered his thanks.

**Princeton Chamber of Commerce: KIOSK**

Peter Crowley, Princeton Chamber of Commerce began the discussion by saying that he reached out to Robert Hilliar for design upgrades to the Kiosk taking into consideration comments that had been previously made. Mr. Hilliar presented variations of the kiosk panels for noticing and recessed panels making them more weatherproof. Mr. Crowley said that in conjunction with the Princeton Merchants Association, they have developed a tiered payment structure for advertising. He said that they have taken into account everything that has been said in meetings about the kiosk and appreciate both the positive and negative feedback.

Ms. Crumiller said that she did think that the new designs are an improvement, but that she still maintains her objection to the project.

Ms. Howard asked what material the kiosk was made from ? Mr. Crowley said that it was made from laminated panels and cork.

Mr. Bruschi said that the Historic Preservation Commission has not yet approved the project although it has been reviewed.

Ms. Butler said that she would like to do away with kiosks altogether. She said that she has heard loud and clear that people like what is there now.

Mr. Bruschi said that the electric that is there services town owned street lights.

Mr. Miller said that he thought that the kiosks were unsightly but the new designs are an improvement.

Ms. Howard said that the kiosk that is currently on Nassau Street is what is unique in our town. She said that we shouldn't fix something that isn't screaming to be fixed.

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Jack Morrison, Princeton Merchants Association said that many people are looking for information and that they do not look at the kiosk as a promotional vehicle. He said that nonprofit agencies will have their own panel, free of charge.

Ann Sears, Princeton Area Arts and Culture said that she supported the project and was encouraged to see the enhancements.

Kristen Applegat, Princeton University said that she agreed with the proposal, especially the new designs.

Mr. Simon asked what the timeline and the cost of the project was. Mr. Crowley said that the project would take approximately 10 weeks at a cost of \$20,000. per kiosk . Mr. Simon said that the designs have been substantially improved and strike a nice balance.

Mr. Liverman said that the project puts public and private partnership in balance.

Ms. Crumiller proposed that the Department of Public Works clean up the kiosk, that a list of businesses be provided and that there not be paid advertising. Ms. Butler supported this proposal.

Mr. Liverman said that he did not support the notion of not supporting businesses and that Mr. Crowley's proposal for the kiosk is win/win.

Mr. Simon agreed with Mr. Liverman and said that the proposal offered the right balance for downtown Princeton.

Mr. Miller said that he was opposed to taxpayers paying for the project.

Ms. Howard said that she did not think that there was a burning need for the project.

Mayor Lempert said that one of the kiosks is in bad shape. Could we do improve one of the kiosks to start with. Ms. Howard agreed with Mayor Lempert's proposal, and Ms. Butler disagreed. Mr. Crowley said that it might be more costly to do the project twice, but said that they could try it.

Mayor Lempert asked that an agreement for one kiosk be placed on the next Council agenda.

### **NJDOT Route 1**

Mayor Lempert reported that New Jersey Department of Transportation plans Route 1 are still very preliminary and far from the the final stages. The Princeton concern is in regard to the east/west flow. She said that there are plans to have more meetings regarding the plan and then come back to Council with a report.

Ms. Butler asked if Princeton University had been involved in the conversations. Kristen Applegat, Princeton University said that they have been engaged with consultants but have no hard data yet and are trying to understand what the information that they do have means.

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Mr. Kiser said that they are aware of timelines and that priorities need to be set.

Candace Preston, White Oak Drive said that there had been a similar situation ten years ago and that there was an advantage to having data. She said that she was concerned that there was no data at this time. She said that the proposed solutions could potentially make things worse. She said that it was irresponsible and that there were flooding issues to be considered. People cannot drive north if there is flooding.

Guy Pierson said that not once did he hear about the impact on local residents and that the proposals are just band aids.

Linda Geevers, West Windsor Council, Hawthorn Drive, asked that the residents of West Windsor be kept in mind, and in particular the residents of Penns Neck. She said that there are many developments in West Windsor that are coming online and need to be considered.

David Paris, Washington Road said that the information on the website came as a terrible shock and to please be considerate of people when sending out information.

Mr. Simon said that he would rather that people were upset now than later. He would rather err on the side of exposing these things than not.

## **WORK SESSION**

### **13-109 Resolution: Conflict of Interest Policy, Brad Middlekauf**

Mr. Middlekauf said that he has met with the personnel committee regarding the conflict of interest policy. He said that as Princeton is the first municipality to consolidate, this policy is also a first and draws a roadmap for other towns to follow.

Mr. Bruschi said that he is comfortable with the proposed policy and that it was a solid start. Mr. Schmierer complimented Mr. Middlekauf for his work on the policy, stating that they were off to a solid start.

Ms. Crumiller said that conflicts of interest do not change, that it's either yes or no. Mr. Middlekauf said that by case law, it is a matter of circumstances or facts and circumstances.

Ms. Butler said that it was like being "a little bit pregnant". Mr. Middlekauff said that he agrees and disagreed with her.

Mr. Simon said that nothing precludes us from coming to conclusions on our own.

Mr. Liverman said that the key is to take responsibility for ourselves on issues. Mr. Liverman said that he felt that the proposed policy was fine.

Mayor Lempert said that nepotism will be covered in the employee personnel policy manual.

Ms Butler said that she did not think that Council should vote on the proposed policy tonight and allow times for comments at another meeting.

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Ingrid Reed thanked Council for delving into a difficult subject. She said that the State Ethics Committee is subjective when ruling on how people should behave.

Mr. Simon said that we are not setting up a local ethics board.

Mr. Schmierer said that conflict issues are fact sensitive.

Mayor Lempert suggested that Council table the resolution and that the proposed policy be brought back to Council at a later date.

### **Prioritization and Delegation of Ordinance Harmonization**

Mr. Bruschi said that the process of the harmonization of ordinances continues, noting that there are many antiquated sections that need to be cleaned up. Ms. Butler asked if the attorney expenses on this project would be significant. Mr. Bruschi said that this is not an inexpensive project.

### **Transco Meeting**

Mr. Kiser reported that there would be a meeting regarding the Transco Pipeline on Thursday, April 11, 2013 in Montgomery Township.

Mr. Kiser also reported that Quaker Road would be reopening on Friday, April 12, 2013.
