

October 24th- SNB conducted a presentation at the Community Park elementary school, which covered several topics including, bicycle safety, stranger danger and Halloween safety.

October 28th- SNB was assigned to the Princeton University Dalai Lama protest.

October 29th- SNB took part in a round table discussion, which covered drug and alcohol trends in Princeton. This discussion was held at the John Witherspoon middle school. There were several parents of students as well as other concerned community members that attended the event.


October 30th- SNB was assigned to the Princeton Halloween parade, which is sponsored by the Princeton Arts Council.

Total Arrests








Total Parking Violations






Patrol Overtime




Dispatch Overtime



- ❖ Cpl. Solovay and K-9 Harris continue to attend the New Jersey State Police K-9 Training Academy, Patrol Class # 15, in order to be a certified Patrol K-9 Team. Training includes obedience, agility, evidence searching, tracking, building clearing, and apprehension.
- ❖ On Wednesday, October 1, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris responded to a request for mutual aid for a bomb threat at Hamilton West High School (Hamilton, NJ). The K-9 team joined others from around Mercer County and the State in clearing the building. After determining the scene to be safe, children were permitted to return to the school.
- ❖ On Saturday, October 4, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris responded to a request for mutual aid for a bomb threat at East Brunswick High School (East Brunswick, NJ). Despite being a Saturday, the school was occupied for a special event that was taking place. The K-9 team joined others from around the State in clearing the building. After determining the scene to be safe, visiting guests were permitted to return to the school.
- ❖ On Wednesday, October 15, 2014, Cpl. Solovay attended a meeting with representatives of Princeton University Department of Public Safety and the United States Diplomatic Security Service for the purpose of developing a comprehensive security plan for the Dalai Lama visit, scheduled for later in the month.
- ❖ On Friday, October 24, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris responded to a request for mutual aid for a bomb threat at Bishop Ahr High School (Edison, NJ). The K-9 team joined others from around the State in clearing the building. After determining the scene to be safe, children were permitted to return to the school.

- ❖ On Saturday, October 25, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris responded to Tom's River, NJ at the request of the Ocean County Sheriff's Department and The New Jersey State Police for assistance in conducting an explosive sweep at their Halloween Special Event. The sweep was conducted without incident and appreciated by the attendees.
- ❖ On Sunday, October 26, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris responded to Washington Rd. in Princeton for a report of a suspicious package. K9 Harris was deployed and did not alert on the package. The package was later determined to be a patio brick, wrapped in packaging material. The scene was deemed safe and the roadway was reopened to all traffic.
- ❖ On Tuesday, October 28, 2014, Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris conducted an explosives sweep at Jadwin Gym at the request of Princeton University Department of Public Safety and the United States Diplomatic Security Service for the visit of his holiness the Dalai Lama. Additionally, Cpl. Solovay was able to secure the assistance of K-9 Teams from several other law enforcement agencies, including- the Mercer County Sheriff's Department, New Jersey Transit Police Department, West Windsor Police Department, Kean University Police Department, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Several of the K-9 Teams, including Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris, conducted subsequent explosive sweeps at Prospect House and Chancellor Green on the Princeton University Campus. Cpl. Solovay and K9 Harris maintained a presence on scene for the duration of the event and conducted bag sniffs at the request of the Diplomatic Security Service to ensure public safety.
